



Anatole Kaletsky

Anatole Kaletsky is a founding partner of GaveKal Capital, a Hong Kong-based financial boutique which provides economic analysis and asset allocation advice to 500 financial institutions around the world, as well as managing \$400m in three specialised investment vehicles. He is also Editor-at-Large of *The Times* of London, where he writes a twice-weekly column on politics, economics and international relations.

Mr Kaletsky was a full-time journalist for *The Times*, *Financial Times* and *The Economist* from 1976 until 1998, when he expanded his activities to include economic forecasting and financial consulting. He worked initially as an external adviser for leading investment businesses, including George Soros's Quantum Fund. In early 2002, he joined forces with Charles and Louis Gave, two prominent Franco-American financiers, to create GaveKal Research, a firm which now includes a New York-based brokerage operation, an economic research business in China and asset-management divisions in Hong Kong and Denver. Mr Kaletsky is also a Director of several investment companies, including the JP Morgan's flagship Emerging Markets Investment Trust. He is a member of the Nuffield Council on Bioethics, Britain's principal advisory body on the public policy issues raised by medical advances, and of the World Economic Forum's International Media Council. In 1998, he was elected by Britain's economics profession to a five-year term on the governing council of the Royal Economic Society.

Mr Kaletsky's journalistic work has won numerous awards and distinctions. In 1996 he was named Newspaper Commentator of the Year in the BBC Press Awards and has twice received the British Press Award for Specialist Writer of the Year, as well as the Wincott Award for economic journalism administered by the Institute of Economic Affairs and the first Cernobbio-Europa prize for European Journalist of the Year.

Prior to his appointment to *The Times*, Mr Kaletsky worked for 12 years on the *Financial Times* in a variety of posts, including New York Bureau Chief, Washington Correspondent, International Economics Correspondent and Moscow Correspondent. He started his journalistic career on *The Economist*, where he wrote about business and finance from 1976 to 1979. He still contributes an annual article on the outlook for the British economy to *The Economist's* best-selling yearbook, *The World In 200x*.



From 1990 to 1996 Mr Kaletsky was Economics Editor of The Times, responsible for all the paper's economic news and analysis. Since relinquishing his executive role in order to create his consultancy business, Mr Kaletsky has remained the paper's principal commentator on economics and international affairs.

Mr Kaletsky was educated at King's College, Cambridge, where he graduated with a First Class degree in Mathematics. He then spent two years at Harvard University as a Kennedy Scholar, receiving an MA in Economics. He has an honorary Doctorate of Science from the University of Buckingham.

Mr Kaletsky was born in 1952 in Moscow, Russia and also lived as a child in Poland and Australia. Since 1966 he has lived in Britain and America. He is now based in London and is married to Fiona Murphy, a TV producer, with two sons and one daughter.
